

Pupil Premium

Academic year 2011/12

Spending

The school received a grant of £42,712 for Pupil Premium in the academic year 2011 – 2012 (*7/12ths (A) + 5/12ths (B)*). This money was used in a number of different ways to support the learning of the students concerned:

Impact of Pupil Premium

In the academic year of 2011/12, the average progress made by children entitled to Free School Meals (n=68 Years 1-6) was 3.16. This was broadly in line with the progress of ALL the children in Years 1-6 which was 3.32.

Children's progress (FSM) was exactly in line with ALL children's progress in both Reading (3.4) and Writing (3.3) and slightly below in Numeracy (FSM 2.7 v ALL 3.2).

The KS1 SAT's average attainment scores were well above national FSM data in Reading (16.2 Abbey v 14.4 national FSM), Writing (14.3 Abbey v 13.2 National FSM) and above in Numeracy (15.5 Abbey v 14.6 national FSM).

The KS2 SAT's average attainment scores were above FSM national for FSM children in Reading and Writing but below (0.6) in Numeracy.

In the current year to date, progress in Writing for pupil premium (PP) children is 1.28 which exceeds the progress of 1.14 for ALL children. For Reading this trend is not continued with a negative gap of 0.4 in progress between PP children and ALL children. Progress is approximately the same in Numeracy between PP children and ALL children at 1.1
