## **Pupil Premium**

#### **Background**

The Government believes that the Pupil Premium, which is additional to main school funding, is the best way to address the current underlying inequalities between children eligible for free school meals (FSM) and their peers by ensuring that funding to tackle disadvantage reaches the pupils who need it most.

The Pupil Premium is allocated to children from low-income families who are currently known to be eligible for FSM in both mainstream and non-mainstream settings and children who have been looked after continuously for more than six months

The Government has decided that eligibility for the Pupil Premium in 2015-16 will continue to be extended to pupils who have been eligible for free school meals (FSM) at any point in the last 6 years. As a group, children who have been eligible for FSM at any point in time have consistently lower educational attainment than those who have never been eligible for FSM.

A premium has also been introduced for children whose parents are currently serving in the armed forces.

#### Allocation

From 1st April 2014 – 31<sup>st</sup> March 2015, Abbey Catholic Primary School received a total of £118,155 (A)

From 1<sup>st</sup> April 2015 – 31<sup>st</sup> August 2015, Abbey Catholic Primary School has currently received £112,040 (B) N.B. Based on £1,320 per FSM pupil.

Schools have been asked to report by academic year as this is more meaningful for parents. Whilst the grant allocation is made on the basis of financial years, schools both plan teaching and other support and conduct assessments over the academic year.

#### Academic year 2014/15

### Spending

The school received a grant of £115,607 for Pupil Premium in the academic year 2014 – 2015(7/12ths (A) + 5/12ths (B)). This money was used in a number of different ways to support the learning of the students concerned:
