Impact

By the end of this unit children will...

By the end of this unit Year Two children will have conducted a local history study about Erdington, developing an understanding of who they are and where they come from. They will begin to understand more their own story, the story of their school and of their parish. "Through their living history, their family at home, whoever that may be, they develop their potentialities, become aware of their dignity and prepare to face their unique and individual destiny." (St. John Paul II, *On the Hundredth Year*)

Children will think deeply about the past and through comparative study, see how this has impacted on the present. They will then begin to think about if and how the actions of people in the past impact on themselves and their future. Children will begin to recognize even more so that we are called to work together, "We are one body, individually members one of another." (Romans 12:4-8).

Science Fiction-

As we explore our text, children will identify how science fiction is used to entertain and to speculate about the future. We will use this story to help develop our own science fiction narrative about a time travelling machine.

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<u>Report</u>

Children will write a historical report showcasing their knowledge from their local history study. Children will write about what Erdington was like in the past and how it has changed.

- Capital letters, full stops, question marks and exclamation marks to demarcate sentences.
- Four sentence types- statement, command, question, exclamation.

Science

Living things and their habitats

Children will:

- explore and compare differences between things that are living, dead and never alive.
- identify that most living things live in habitats to which they are suited.
- describe how different habitats provide for the basic needs of different kinds of animals and plants, and how they depend on each other. (revisiting)
- identify and name a variety of plants and animals in their habitats, including micro-habitats.
