
Does humanity live well within the limits of nature?





Impact

By the end of this unit children will...

Throughout this unit children will gain further understanding on their knowledge of Earth. They will be able to identify the position and significance of longitude and latitude as well as the tropics and hemispheres. As they explore the geographical features of Earth they will begin to see how the natural resources are used and distributed throughout the world's population through trade and question whether these practices are sustainable and ethical. Children will discuss how God's creations are being exploited and how they can make a difference to the future of the planet by living within their limits. They will explore how population, mass consumption and climate change are impacting our natural resources and environment and raise awareness of these issues, particularly famine, through their creative writing and formal speech.

Intent

Through the delivery of this unit children will have the opportunity to explore how the world's natural resources are used. They will begin to formulate their own opinions on the state of the Earth and discuss whether any one of God's creations should have priority over others.

Core Subjects

English

During this topic, pupils will write a ...

Narrative to inform their parents about global famine, inspired by *The Lorax* by *Dr Seuss and The Last Tree by Emily Haworth-Booth*.

Formal speech to explain the Madagascan famine and how we can make a change for the common good to our followers on X.

SPaG focus: hyphens, punctuation for parenthesis, relative clauses, passive verbs, bullet points and semi-colons.

Spelling: Words ending in –ant, -ance and –ancy; words ending in –ent and – ence; words ending in in –able, -ible, -ably and –ibly; Year 5/6 words.

In **Guided Reading**, pupils will be reading *Melt by Ele Fountain*, exploring the text through VIPERS (vocabulary, inference, prediction, explanation, retrieval, summarising and sequencing).

Science

Forces:

- Explain that unsupported objects fall towards the Earth because of the force of gravity acting between the Earth and the falling object.
- Identify the effects of air resistance, water resistance and friction, that act between moving surfaces.
- Recognise that some mechanisms including levers, pulleys and gears allow a smaller force to have a greater effect.

Locational knowledge

- Identify the position and significance of latitude, longitude, Equator, Northern Hemisphere, Southern Hemisphere, the Tropics of Cancer and Capricorn, Arctic and Antarctic Circle.
- Identify Prime/Greenwich Meridian and time zones.

 Describe and understand key aspects of human geography including the distribution of natural resources including food and minerals.

Art and Design and Design Technology

Art and Design

Pupils will explore a variety of different photography from the Madagascar famine and evaluate this as a source of information.

Pupils will then develop their drawing and use of colour skills to create their own piece of artwork about the Madagascar famine.

Skills:

- Produce increasingly accurate drawings of people.
- Produce increasingly detailed preparatory sketches for painting and other work.
- Introduce the concept of perspective.
- Controlling and experimenting particular qualities of tone, shades, hue and mood.
- Use colours to express moods and feelings.

Multiplication and Division- during this unit, pupils will be taught to:

- Pupils will be taught to multiply a 4-digit number by a 1-digit number.
- Multiply a 2-digit number by a 2-digit number.
- Multiply a 3-digit number by a 2-digit number.
- Multiply a 4-digit number by a 2-digit number.
- Use short division.
- Divide a 4-digit number by a 1-digit number.
- Divide with remainders.
- Solve problems with multiplication and division.

Fractions- during this unit, pupils will be taught to:

- Multiply a unit and non-unit fraction by an integer.
- Multiply a mixed number by an integer.
- Calculate a fraction of a quantity.
- Find a fraction of an amount.
- Find the whole.
- Use fractions as operators.

Pupils should continue to apply and develop a broader range of skills, learning how to use them in different ways and to link them to make actions and sequences of movement.
