
Does the economy always serve society?





Impact

By the end of this unit children will...

That the economy must serve the people and not, that the people work to serve the economy.

As we delve deeper into our 'Big question' we will work around the theme of 'The rights of the worker'. We will be exploring trade and the economy, we will look into the UK's import and export links: understanding that every person has the right to work and earn a fair and just wage. We will look into who the UK trades with and why, and how this impacts upon the worker and their communities. Children will come to a deeper understanding of the significance of fair trade and how this actively promotes a fairer economy and the right of the worker.

Intent

It is our vision that our children will become advocates for social justice, fighters for sustainability, seekers of equality and leaders seeking to become "builders of a new humanity" *Pope Francis*. Through this unit of work children will develop a deeper understanding of rights we all have and what they can do to help build equality amongst workers.

Core Subjects

English

During this topic, pupils will write a...

Narrative inspired by the Titanium music video that will entertain KS2 children using tension and suspense.

SPaG focus: parenthesis; relative clauses; semi-colons, colons or dashes to mark boundaries; ensuring the consistent and correct use of tense throughout a piece of writing

Spelling: words with the suffix '-ably'; words with the suffix '-ible'; words with the suffix '-ibly'; words ending in '-ent' and '-ence'; words ending in '-er', '-or' and '-ar'; adverbs synonymous with determination

In <u>Guided Reading</u>, pupils will be revising the VIPERS (vocabulary, inference, prediction, explanation, retrieval, summaries and sequences) using a range of fiction and non-fiction texts.

Science

Light

Pupils will be able to:

- recognise that light appears to travel in straight lines
- use the idea that light travels in straight lines to explain that objects are seen because they give out or reflect light into the eye
- explain that we see things because light travels from light sources to our eyes or from light sources to objects and then to our eyes
- use the idea that light travels in straight lines to explain why shadows have the same shape as the objects that cast them.

Easter

In this unit, the children will study the story of Easter from the perspective of Thomas; they will think about reasons why Thomas did not believe in the Resurrection of Christ at first and why people today believe that Jesus is risen from the dead. They will also learn about Easter and the promise of eternal life and be introduced to some associations with Baptism and the celebration of a Christian funeral.

Baptism & Confirmation

In this unit, the children will learn about the celebration of the Sacraments of Baptism and Confirmation. They will explore the signs and symbols of both these Sacraments and will hear about the gift of the Holy Spirit being given in the celebration of these Sacraments.

Pentecost

In this unit, the children will learn about two stories from the New Testament about the coming of the Holy Spirit. Through their study of the Sacrament of Confirmation, they will learn about the Gifts and Fruits of the Holy Spirit and how they are important in the lives of Christians.

Cricket
